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- 1.1 All copies should be typewritten with double spacing and wide margins.
- 1.2 In addition to the hard copy, material should also, if possible, be sent on disk (in text only format) to facilitate and expedite the setting of the manuscript.
- 1.3 Abbreviations should be spelt out when first used in the text. Scientific measurements should be expressed in SI units throughout, with two exceptions: blood pressure should be given in mmHg and haemoglobin as g/dl.
- 1.4 All numerals should be written as such (ie not spelt out) except at the beginning of a sentence.
- 1.5 Tables, references and legends for illustrations should be typed on separate sheets and should be clearly identified. Tables should carry Roman numerals, thus: I, II, III, etc and illustrations should have Arabic numerals, thus: 1, 2, 3 etc.
- 1.6 The author's contact details should be given on the title page, ie telephone, mobile, fax numbers, and e-mail address.

### 2. FIGURES

- 2.1 Figures consist of all material which cannot be set in type, such as photographs, line drawings, etc. (Tables are not included in this classification and should not be submitted as photographs). Photographs should be glossy prints, not mounted, untrimmed and unmarked. Where possible, all illustrations should be of the same size, using the same scale.
- 2.2 Figure numbers should be clearly marked with a sticker on the back and the top of the illustration should be indicated.

- 2.3 Where identification of a patient is possible from a photograph the author must submit consent to publication signed by the patient, or the parent or guardian in the case of a minor.

### 3. REFERENCES

- 3.1 References should be inserted in the text as superior numbers and should be listed at the end of the article in numerical order.
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Names and initials of all authors should be given unless there are more than six, in which case the first three names should be given followed by "et al". First and last page numbers should be given.

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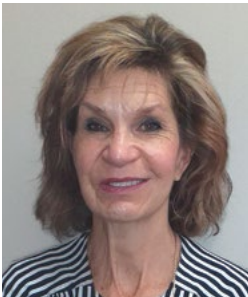

## Professor Leanne Sykes

### On being: Personally and Professionally

Bill Gates once stated that *"There are two great forces in human nature: self-interest, and caring for others."* Thus, according to him, in the game of life there will be those players who are so set on personal gains that they will do anything in their power to "win", even if it is at the expense of others. At the same time, there will also be players who are so committed to serve the interests of the other, that they set

aside their own needs in the process. In the extreme cases, the former selfishly seek self-fulfilment and benefits, often at the expense of others, while the latter selflessly and altruistically strive to please and serve others, and in the process may end up physically, mentally or emotionally burnt out themselves. Neither trait is desirable if it is displayed on a permanent basis. Thus, it would seem that there is a need to find a midway solution that will be beneficial to both. Adam Grant, wrote an insightful book wherein he compared people who were predominantly selfless (self-sacrificing) givers with the selfish takers. He proposed two additional categories. The third are those he considered to be apathetic, and who show a general indifference towards themselves and others. The fourth are those who have found an ideal balance between giving, taking, and reaching personal goals. He called this category the "other-ish" group, and described them as "successful givers who know how to maintain concern for themselves as well as others".<sup>1,2</sup> They genuinely care about helping people, but still want to achieve their own ambitions and interests. They don't see these two aims as being in conflict, and strive to achieve the best for everyone. I have based this editorial on his model, and tried to see if it could be applied to the practice of medicine and dentistry.

Apathetic practitioners are those who have very little concern for advancing themselves or their practices. They don't set high personal or professional goals for themselves, and don't strive to achieve great wealth, repute, clinical or academic prowess. They show little interest in attending refresher courses, reading current literature, or making an effort to update their practices and skills. As a result, their scope and sphere of expertise may stagnate, and they will continue to practice in the same manner that they were taught, no matter how long ago they graduated. While not intentionally acting malevolently, they could end up doing their patients a dis-service if they fail to keep up to date with current trends, materials and techniques, and continue to practice in a dated manner.

The next group are those clinicians who go out of their way to please their patients, no matter what the personal costs. This can be manifest in a myriad of ways. They may always try to satisfy every patient's needs, demands and desires, no matter how unrealistic the

expectations. This is humanly impossible, yet when they fail, they tend to take it personally and may become stressed or depressed. Some try to give every patient the best possible treatment regardless of the patient's ability to pay for the treatment, and may might undercharge for their services, sponsor materials, or even cover laboratory costs, resulting in them being out of pocket. Others concede to patient's desires for treatment times, and may start work very early or finish late, and perhaps work over weekends or on public holidays to accommodate their patients' schedules. In so doing they sacrifice personal relaxation and family time. They could find themselves being pressurised to carry out more complex procedures they are not skilled enough to handle where patients cannot afford to see a specialist, but still want to have a procedure done. This places immense stress on an ethically conscious practitioner, who may also have to endure the fear of failure or the repercussions of actual failure. While being selfless is admirable, the clinician who is a relentlessly selfless giver and who does not keep an eye on their own interests can end up doing a greater dis-service to themselves. They run the risk of burning out and / or developing resentment towards their careers. This in turn deprives them of energy, and leaves them in a state where they are of no use to the very people they set out to please. This situation was echoed by Prof Flavia Senkubuge in her speech to the new grandaunts at the May 2022 Graduation ceremony where she stated "There is no honour in NOT taking care of yourself".

Diametrically opposed to the self-sacrificing givers are the selfish takers. These practitioners are driven by self-interest and have a "Succeed all costs mentality". They crave rewards (usually financial) and as such may see patients as a means to them fulfilling their own needs and desires. This becomes evident in how they structure their practice and patient care and can result in them behaving in any number of unethical ways such as: They may favour intervention above prevention, promote and recommend more complex and costly treatment over equally suitable yet cheaper conservative options, make use of excessive diagnostic aids that were not essential for diagnostic or treatment purposes, promote procedures according to materials or equipment they have purchased to offset the costs of these, charge inflated fees, underpay their own staff, expect assistants to work for extended hours with no extra remuneration, promote purely cosmetic or aesthetic services, advertise themselves on social media sites to attract patients, over-inflate their abilities, give patients false expectations to entice them into having certain procedures done, cut costs on materials, use expired, cheap or even non-certified materials, accept kickbacks from company representatives in exchange for using their products preferentially, not present patients with all possible treatment options, and only elaborate on those they wish to carry out, and at worst may become guilty of over servicing. They are often able to justify and defend the aforementioned if questioned. However, it becomes easy for these practitioners to slide down the slippery slope from being an

ethical caregiver towards becoming maleficent or even guilty of malpractice.<sup>3</sup>

The final group display what may be considered the best characteristics of being balanced successful givers. These clinicians have ambitious goals for themselves, but at the same time want to act in a beneficent manner and also benefit their patients. In contrast to the selfless givers who sacrifice the self and focus on people, they focus on interests and are proactive about understanding how to make a positive impact. They do not exist merely to please, but have a well-defined purpose and plan, which enables them to decide how, where, and how much to give and how much to take. They develop well-defined boundaries with rules to help them preserve their own well-being. Instead of becoming victims and risking burn out, they become energized by their choices. They learn how to trust most of the people most of the time, and as such avoid being used or becoming doormats to the needs and demands of others. They do not have the need to always be giving, and are adaptable enough to know how to pair empathy with reason. More importantly, they know when to ask for help and are willing to do so if needed.

In terms of their careers, they will spend time attending professional development courses, learning new skills, and investing in the latest materials and technology. This in turn allows them to offer the best possible treatment to all their patients. They take pride in their work, and practice according to high legal and ethical standards. They acknowledge and value their own worth, and will not sell themselves short in terms of their abilities. They may at times charge higher fees with a clear conscience if they believe their skills and knowledge are deserving of this. They gain satisfaction and fulfilment from both justifiable financial compensation, as well as from knowing that their standards will hold them in high repute amongst colleagues and patients. They manage to structure their lives in order to strike a good balance between work, family, self-time, hobbies, sport

and relaxation, and are able to pursue and fulfil their own desires guiltlessly. They have indeed mastered the art of both paying attention to others, as well as to themselves, which allows them to maintain their energy, enthusiasm and joy.<sup>4</sup>

Perhaps then the take home message should be our goals in life and in the practice of medicine and dentistry should be to focus on ALL interests, and to strive for the ideal balance between giving and taking. To grow and go from which ever point you identify as your own default position towards becoming a truly "successful giver". In other words, to become clinicians who strive to gain the BEST for themselves and deliver the BEST to others. To quote Robert Holden "Your relationship with yourself sets the tone for every other relationship you have".<sup>5</sup>

## Transformation of The Colleges of Medicine of SA (CMSA)

Prior to 1954, specialist trainees had to travel to the United Kingdom or Ireland to sit for the examinations of the Royal Colleges of Edinburgh, Glasgow, London, or Dublin. In 1954, The College of Physicians and Surgeons of South Africa (CPSSA) was founded and was registered as a non-profit company in 1955. In 1957 the name changed to The College of Physicians, Surgeons, and Gynaecologists of South Africa.

In 1969 The College of Physicians, Surgeons and Gynaecologists of South Africa amalgamated with the South African College of General Practitioners to form the College of Medicine of South Africa (CMSA). In 1998 the name was changed to The Colleges of Medicine of South Africa (CMSA).<sup>1</sup> By offering trainees an alternative to the Royal Colleges, the CMSA represented a significant stride in transforming the landscape of specialist medicine examinations. Additionally, it signalled the beginnings of decolonising specialist examinations by offering home grown South African and African specialist examinations of international standards.

The CMSA, emerging from an apartheid educational and healthcare system, was not immune to the national challenges key among these, racial and gender inequality. In this segregated system many labelled and considered the CMSA a "white" institution and a "boys' club". Indeed, the work of amalgamation of the CMSA was dictated by numerous policy positions in particular the White Paper for the Transformation of the Health System in South Africa of 1997 which sought to restructure and transform the health system<sup>2</sup>.

A significant part of the amalgamation project of the CMSA was to bring onboard all training platforms nationally. The disparities were indeed glaring. For instance, candidates who were trained at under-resourced training platforms mainly from historically disadvantaged medical schools had poorer pass rates compared to others. Additionally, challenges presented relating to standard setting with the advent of CMSA becoming the national unitary examination body in 2011. As with the national transformation agenda, the CMSA's journey was no different and redress was needed urgently to deal with a number of challenges mainly: perceptions of examiner bias towards black candidates, legal challenges, protest actions with calls to reintroduce the local university Master of Medicine (MMed) examinations, and a hostile and unkind environment.

The elected 2019 - 2022 triennium leadership team of the CMSA had the opportunity to build on the work of previous leaders of the CMSA and to heed the clarion call to urgently transform the organisation. The leadership team recognised that in order to have

true transformation of the CMSA, there was a need to rebuild its architecture. A new strategic agenda document, Agenda 2022 was then developed and implemented. Agenda 2022 sought to rebuild the CMSA architecture and embed our shared value of Ubuntu ("I am because we are") as the fabric and root of the CMSA. Shared humanity was the cornerstone of Agenda 2022.

As a moment of pause, it is important to highlight some of the ingredients of what contributed to the success of the Agenda 2022 transformation strategy. Firstly, the 2019 - 2022 triennium leadership team saw a historical milestone with the election of its first black female President of the CMSA, Prof Flavia Senkubuge together with Prof Johan Fagan as the senior Vice President and Prof Gboyega Ogunbanjo (RIP) as Vice President supported by the immediate past president Prof Mike Sathekge. Having such a diverse and experienced presidium leadership team meant that long standing items on the agenda such as racial and gender inequity were fully prioritised for action.

Second, the presidium, board and senate committed to co-creation of a new agenda and open honest dialogue within the CMSA and with all its stakeholders. As part of the commitment to co-creation of the transformation agenda, the CMSA embarked on national Listening Tours so as to get the voice and recommendations of examiners, candidates, and all its stakeholders. All the recommendations from the Listening Tours were integrated into Agenda 2022 and formed part of the plan of action for transformation.

Third, the entire CMSA used their own lived experiences to embrace difficult conversations and to have interesting textured discussions during the triennium that led to real transformative change. Introduction of open communication with the leadership led to open dialogue so that all were felt, seen, and heard. The adoption and demand of change from hostile dialogue to an environment of kindness, compassion, appreciation and empathy created a safe space for open and honest dialogue.

Fourth, a focus on the organisation itself and staff was important. The CMSA was fully restructured into a national organisation and broke the silos that characterised regional offices. Further, a program was implemented to improve the organisational culture where staff are now seen, heard, and valued. Investment and redress of salary inequities among staff was also done together with a funding commitment towards scholarships for staff education to upskill staff members.



Fifth, restructuring of the entire examination process was instituted ensuring that the examination process was open, transparent, credible, open to scrutiny, replicable and maintained the highest standards. Also employing the best staff such as a new CEO Prof Eric Buch, who is part of the medical fraternity and is a solid pair of hands ensured that the decisions of the leadership were implemented and also communicated to stakeholders. Prof Vanessa Burch, one of the top medical educationalists in the country also joined the CMSA and her presence has driven and indeed transformed the CMSA examinations. In fact, the CMSA is now seen as a global leader in the decentralised examinations.

Lastly, adoption of good governance as a focus of the revised architecture to drive the transformation agenda was also a keystone of Agenda 2022. This included revising and mainstreaming all decisions into new policies therefore ensuring that the transformation agenda is not a band aid but is entrenched in CMSA's fiber, its core DNA and will last for years to come.

In summary, the leadership of the CMSA had a shared and firm understanding of the critical importance to actively transform the CMSA given the diversity of its membership, candidates, and stakeholders. The presidium had a firm focus to accelerate the pace of transforming the gender and racial compositions of the CMSA leadership, to make examinations fairer, to make examinations and admission ceremonies regionally more accessible, and to make the CMSA a "People's College". However, the CMSA being a membership and volunteer organization, required a nuanced approach for success to ensure a sense of inclusivity and representativity among all and it will be remiss not to mention that indeed, some withdrew from the CMSA in protest to measures introduced to accelerate transformation.

This then brings this article to some observations on transformation using the CMSA lens. As in any institution transformation always remains a challenging and highly sensitive task. More so in organisations as old as the CMSA, with entrenched structures and architecture where the executive is called upon to dismantle pre-existing practices that are embedded within the DNA of such an organisation. Patriarchy, misogyny, racism, ageism, and sexism are all areas that needed to be redressed within the CMSA. Great strides have been taken in doing so, and the CMSA is more aware than ever that this will be an ongoing journey. Therefore, we must continue to observe, monitor, listen and learn, in order to do better and be better and continuously raise the bar.

As an organisation whose core mandate is that of examinations, the CMSA's highest priority remains the specialist-in-training and its examiners ensuring that the CMSA is able to deliver the highest quality examinations that are both fair and equitable, that is without fear or favour or prejudice. The CMSA has worked hard to ensure that candidate specialists are examined within safe learning environments that do not impair the mental health of our specialists in the long run. Hence the message of empathy, compassion and kindness has been entrenched into the CMSA as part of its transformation agenda.

It is always important to bear in mind that transformation at the

CMSA has included a myriad of areas that needed to be addressed, from race relations and gender equity to the entire manner in which work at the CMSA is done. In so doing, and in the pursuit of a responsive and transparent administration, the CMSA has ensured that transformation extended not only to the specialist-in-training, but also to its staff. The staff of the CMSA are the backbone of an incredibly complex machinery that ensures fair and efficient examinations. Continuing to address challenges faced by staff in various working capacities at the CMSA will ensure improved outcomes for the entire CMSA family and its stakeholders.

Indeed, the different tiers and spaces of the CMSA have all been subjected to intense scrutiny to ensure that the CMSA is an organisation that is representative, fair and a true "People's College"; from specialists-in-training to staff members, as well as the senate, the executive, and stakeholders. By ensuring that the CMSA has more female representation leading the various constituent colleges, as well as more representation of people of colour in the different councils, the CMSA has taken great steps to ensure that all voices are heard and are given a platform, to either voice grievances and concerns, or even in some cases, to offer thanks and / or advice.

It has been a truly humbling experience to see that the efforts that the leadership has worked so hard to implement at the CMSA in terms of transformation, are acknowledged. This is not only through the increased number of female graduates and graduates of colour, but also the recent awarding of the Standard Bank Top Gender Empowered Company 2022, according to which the CMSA was ranked as one of South Africa's Top Gender Empowered Companies in our sector for 2022 "for actively creating initiatives to sustainably celebrate and uplift women and organisations, hence contributing to gender empowerment". This award serves to confirm that transformation HAS taken place at the CMSA.

As we conclude this article it is imperative to highlight some key transformation milestones in the CMSA in just three (3) years:

- Professor Flavia Senkubuge elected the first black female president of the CMSA (May 2019 – May 2022)
- Ms Yolokazi Kanzi appointed first black academic registrar of the CMSA
- 66% of Senators are of colour
- 55% of Senators are female
- 29% of Constituent Colleges are led by female Presidents from 14% many being historical firsts
- 95% of CMSA staff are female
- CMSA receives Standard Bank Top Gender Empowered Company 2022 award in recognition of gender transformation
- As part of ensuring inclusivity the CMSA has embraced dispersed examination sites, and is opening new regional offices in rural provinces like the Eastern Cape



- Admission ceremonies are held across the country, including the Eastern Cape for the first time in the CMSA's history
- Complete overhaul of the examination process which has led to increased pass rates without compromising standards and ensuring equity in the examination processes. Some revisions include: a complete revision and redrafting of new policies that govern examination to ensure equity, fairness and transparency; introduction of blueprints; introduction of candidate webinars and examiner webinars; essay questions converted to SBA and short answer questions, and unstructured orals converted to structured oral examinations with memoranda and examination feedback given to candidates
- Participating in introduction of Work Based Assessment (WBA) for universities to assess clinical competence and selecting Entrustable Professional Activities (EPAs) that are achievable at all training platforms.

In conclusion, at the heart of any transformation journey, what is important to remember and hold close, is that it is exactly that...a journey. Undoing the many injustices of the past cannot happen overnight. It is a daily journey that needs to be walked, together with all involved, from the executive to all levels of the CMSA. Having said that, it does not dismiss the urgency with which this process needs to happen and to be implemented, because one day too long, is one day too many.

Honorable guests, distinguished VIPs, Deans, CEO of hospitals, senators, parents, family, friends and our most special guests the graduates. I am so honoured to be speaking this evening in my capacity as the outgoing President of The Colleges of Medicine of South Africa (CMSA). I want to begin my speech by acknowledging the traditional custodians of the land on which we hold this admission ceremony tonight. I pay my respects to their

elders past and present and extend my respect to their descendants here today.

Moments such as these are often such a deep juxtaposition between joy and, perhaps even nostalgia. The joy of looking back at an incredible term and everything that was achieved during that time, but also the nostalgia at coming to the end of the road.

R.M Ballantyne, a Scottish author, once said, "To part is the lot of all mankind. The world is a scene of constant leave-taking, and the hands that grasp in cordial greeting today, are doomed ere long to unite for the last time, when quivering lips pronounce the word-farewell." So as I stand here today to close my term of office as president, I say farewell and not just farewell, but so much more. I say thank you, for so much, but most of all, for the privilege and honour to serve as the president of The Colleges of Medicine of South Africa.

Thank you for hearing me at every ceremony as I reminded our delegation and audience, that I stood as the first black woman president in the 66 year history of the CMSA, because representation matters. Thank you for the opportunity to use my voice and platform, to add my voice to the many that call for kindness, compassion and humility. I thank my colleagues on this stage for daring, being bold and having the tenacity of trusting this girl from a small town in the Eastern Cape to lead this august and prestigious organisation, The Colleges of Medicine of South Africa.

Many of us have heard throughout the years, the story of the young boy walking along the sea shore and throwing star fish that had washed onto the beach back into the water, when a man walked passed him and said "You're not going to make a difference, because you'll never be able to throw all the starfish on this beach back into the ocean!" when the young boy picked up one more starfish and put it back into the water, and asked the man, "it made a difference to that one didn't it?"

That lesson rang true to me so often during our term of office. As we

advocated for kindness, compassion, humility and empathy, at times as is expected in any leadership journey, the question would come up, is anyone hearing, is any difference being made? You may have plans for your future, but life may take you even further than you are able to imagine.

I am an avid art lover, and one of my favourite artists is Frida Khalo and one of my favourite quotes of hers is the following, "Don't mind me, I am from another planet, I still see horizons, where you draw boarders". I encourage every single one of you today to see horizons for yourselves, in your personal lives and in your careers. Do not draw boarders around yourselves, but rather see and chase the horizons, because you just never know where life may take you next. Allow yourselves to celebrate this moment and take the rest you need after the gruelling years of specialising. Then get back up and do more, keep at it, because just when you think you cannot do anymore, that is when you're able to push one step further.

Serving as the president of this prestigious body has been one my life's greatest honours, and the significance of the moment has not been lost on me. I have been truly blessed to work with an incredible team.

Our staff ably led by our CEO Prof Erich Buch together with the executive team, Prof Burch the Executive Director of Examinations and Assessment, Mrs Yolokazi Kanzi our Academic Registrar have been phenomenal and have during this term stepped in and given it their all in steering this ship through choppy waters. To the entire CMSA family, the Board, Senators, Examiners, Deans and all our



Stakeholders, thank you. I want in a special way to thank the board members of the CMSA, the many many late nights, your commitment and resilience to making sure that the CMSA stood firm is appreciated more than words can say.

We have both learnt so much during this process, your unwavering support has been so valuable to me. I cannot imagine anyone better placed to step into the role of President of the CMSA than you, and I know the CMSA will be in excellent hands under your leadership. To our Immediate Past President (IPP) Prof Mike Sathekge and all the past Presidents, you were just a phone call away. You have guided and supported me and been my greatest cheerleaders, thank you.

I do want to mention the women of the CMSA, and those of our medical fraternity. Thank you my dear mothers, aunts, sisters and daughters for holding me up in light and prayer. To my darling precious friends and family, I love you. Thank you for the treasure you are to me. Thank you for covering me in prayer and for surrounding me with so much love that strengthened me and made the journey blessed and enjoyable.

As leaders in this triennium, we led as our forefathers led, not in a hierarchical straight line behind each other but in a circle where

each voice, each person mattered and counted. In my capacity as grandma and now elder of the CMSA, I want to offer words of wisdom and blessing to our new leadership Profs Johan Fagan, Zach Koto, Johnny Mahlangu.

Lead as our forefathers led! Do not be afraid of listening and hearing the voice of all our people regardless of their station and role. Know that the spirit of our ancestors and the great divine is always with you so, do not fear, lead boldly. Do not fear, the gods will always look out for you and will always protect you. Do not fear. Be intentional and humble and when in doubt always do the right thing. Know always that you are not alone and we will fight for you and support you in all you do because this is our college, the peoples college. Never forget that it is the people who make up this great institution. See them, hear them, let them always be welcome. I also want to say to you that there is no honour in not taking care of yourself, please take care of yourselves always. As I hand over the baton today, I am comforted in knowing that as I look at every graduate seated before us today, the future looks bright, the future is in good hands.

Many have asked me how I would like to be remembered now that my term is over. But I can say, it is not about being remembered. It is simply about the impact of the work we have done, making a lasting mark on the medical fraternity. And most importantly, to remember that I did not arrive at the point alone. I have had support, encouragement and advice from so many. Many have paved the way, to ensure that I am able to stand here today, as I too pave the way for those who will come after me. I truly stand on the shoulders of giants!

So as I loosely borrow from the script of Troy, I will close by saying: "If they ever tell my story, let them say that I walked with giants. Men and women may rise and fall like winter wheat, but these names will never die. Let them say, I led in the times of Sathekge, Fagan, Koto, Ogunbanjo, Mahlangu, Lindeque, Vellemer, Davidson, Pitcher, Ngcelwane, Mngomezulu, Geduld, Dunn, Gopalan, Makgotloe, Seedat, Vorster, Rantloane, Cassim and so many giants"

May blessings follow you all as you find new journeys to travel, may you walk safely along the pathways to your dreams, keep your faces turned towards the sun, and the shadows will always fall behind you. Colleagues, it has been an honour. I thank you!

## Face to Face Admission Ceremonies The Colleges of Medicine of SA (CMSA)

The first Face-to-Face Admission Ceremonies since the COVID-19 Pandemic for the 2020/2021 Diplomates, Fellows and Certificants were held over March, April and June in Durban, Mthatha, Gauteng, Cape Town and Bloemfontein.

At the opening of the Durban, Mthatha, Gauteng and Cape Town ceremonies the President, Professor Flavia Senkubuge asked the audience to observe a moment's silence for prayer and meditation. 16 medallists were congratulated by the President on their outstanding performance in the CMSA examinations. Medals were awarded in the following disciplines, Anaesthetics, Cardiology, Emergency Medicine, Family Physicians, Nuclear Physicians, Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Ophthalmology, Otorhinolaryngology, Paediatrics, Pathology, Psychiatry and Physicians.

The President announced that she would proceed with the admission to the CMSA of the new Certificants, Fellows and Diplomates. The new Certificants, Fellows and Diplomates were announced and congratulated.

The Honorary Registrar - Examinations and Credentials and the Chairman - Examinations and Credentials, Professor Victor Mngomezulu and Professor Mthunzi Ngcelwane announced the candidates, in order, to be congratulated by the President, followed by the National Anthem.

In total, the President admitted 98 Certificants, 766 Fellows and 433 Diplomates.

### **PROFESSOR BILKISH CASSIM ADMISSION CEREMONY - DURBAN 10 MARCH 2022**

Professor Senkubuge, Senators, Family and Friends, Diplomates, Fellows and Certificants, good evening.

I am humbled and honoured to be part of this graduation tonight, which is particularly special given the prevailing circumstances. In the words of the late Archbishop Tutu: "We are fragile creatures, and it is from this weakness, not despite it, that we discover the possibility of true joy." He also goes on to say: "Life is filled with challenges and adversity and the most important thing about life is that we all want to be happy regardless of who we are, where we are, or which religion, or creed, or culture we come from."

This graduation ceremony is indeed a happy occasion. We have risen above the challenges to celebrate your great achievement and this evening should be full of joy and happiness. Congratulations to you all.

To those graduating, those who are here and those who could not be here, the examiners, trainers, and the administrative and executive staff of the CMSA, particularly, the President of the CMSA, for having the foresight to institute innovative changes to ensure that this graduation could take place today.

In the deepest and darkest hours of our times in the past two years, I think many of you were not even sure that you would have an examination. The fact that it occurred and the fact that you are here today is really an exceptional achievement that we need to celebrate. It is quite ironic that I have been asked to address you tonight. You are embarking on your careers as consultants, specialist, super-specialists, and I have just completed my career with UKZN. So, when preparing for this talk, I wondered what will resonate with you and I thought that sharing some of my experiences might.

Perhaps I should start when I was a student at the University of Natal Black section, as it was called in those days. Those were turbulent times. We became socially and politically aware and a lot of the future leaders of this country came from the UNB. At that time, we "fought" against the government of the day in our quest to achieve equal care for everybody. A lot of you here, may not have been born at the time, but some of you might remember how difficult it was for Black students as well as Black patients at the public healthcare facilities. But they were joyous times as well, when we balanced studying with building long lasting friendships in what was a unique mix of students from all over the country in the only medical school for Black students in South Africa.

Back to tonight, we can see, on stage and in the audience, the better representation of our population. While we need to appreciate the changes, we still have some way to go. I therefore pose to you – have things really changed all that much? Do you think, particularly those of you graduating today, that our medical schools, universities, and health care facilities, are where they should be? And if not, what are you going to do about it? There is still a great deal of poverty in our country. The people who you are going to treat, particularly in the public sector, are still poor. A lot of them are still disenfranchised, do not know what they can ask for or are too scared to ask for more. With great achievement comes great the expectation that you will look at these problems in our community and healthcare sector and make positive changes.



When I was a registrar, as you have been recently, we worked hard not only under very poor conditions but in a very strict hierarchical structure. As a registrar, one was nearly at the bottom of the hierarchy, and if the senior registrar or consultant stood up, you did as well, with no discussion or argument. Despite this disciplined environment, the ethos for training and service provision was incredible. But there is a fine line between discipline and terror. In your future interaction with students, interns, and registrars, ask for discipline but don't inflict terror. Do not perpetuate what you hated in your training and be the change you want to see. Be more sensitive to the needs of students and registrars, recognize that they are people first, adults often with their own families, and treat them well.

One of the positive things I remember about being a registrar is the camaraderie between colleagues. When I first started as a registrar in medicine, I was terrified. I did not know what to do and the senior registrar held my hand through my first intake – figuratively, not literally, and that was the ambience in which we worked.

We created a network of registrars across different disciplines. And we knew and treated everybody in the hospital, including the nursing, laboratory, and allied health staff as equals. Today it appears that doctors often work in their own little silos and perhaps do not appreciate how much the other health care workers, especially the nursing staff, contribute to their success.

Your registrar training has been during a particularly difficult time, right in the middle of the COVID pandemic. While we experienced the cholera and typhoid epidemics and the start of the HIV epidemic in the 1980s, your experience is unprecedented.

For the first time that I am aware, the high risk of transmission to health care workers engendered fear. Fear that you were going to be infected, and many of you were, or that you would take the virus home to your family. This fear was fueled by the death of many health care workers who succumbed to this virus. At the same time, the expectation from healthcare workers was high, especially for registrars and those who cared for patients with COVID in high care and intensive care units. Many of you had to don triple Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and avoid close contact with your families, especially parents.

I am not sure that the general public or health departments realize how difficult this was for the health care workers at the coal face, both physically and psychologically. It was particularly difficult to treat our own colleagues and watch them succumb.

I want to pay homage to those who worked in the ICUs, particularly at Inkosi Albert Luthuli Central Hospital, for their excellent service under trying circumstances, for continuing the battle, despite the high mortality rates and little acknowledgement.

Despite the pressure of being held to a higher standard than any other group, we have learnt some lessons from this pandemic. There was an exceptional camaraderie between colleagues, and it was “all hands-on deck”.

At the Inkosi Albert Luthuli Central Hospital, as I am sure in other hospitals around the country, all medical staff regardless of the discipline in which they worked, were seconded to COVID wards or ICU's.

This meant that whether you were training in Orthopaedics, ENT, or Ophthalmology for example, you were asked to go work in the COVID wards or in the ICU. This took you back to your roots, and I want to emphasize that, even today, as you become specialists and sub-specialists, remember that you are primarily trained to be a doctor with no other affiliations.

As you go forward, remember to see the whole patient, rather than a knee, or a heart, or a lung. Being older and considered to be “vulnerable”, I was exempted from COVID duty and retrospectively, I feel guilty that I did not do enough while you, the younger generation, took over the baton.

I salute you for your dedication and passion and the humanity you showed during the COVID pandemic. Thank you.

Then there is the lighter side to the pandemic. As health care workers, we were one of the few groups who could leave home during the Level 5 lock down, parking was not an issue, we learnt new uses of old words, such as “waves” and new platforms, such as zoom. We also learnt that South African Scientists are amongst the best in the world, but I do wish that they had kept some detail quiet. On the other hand, we were disappointed at the non-availability of PPE that was supposed to protect us and the circumstances around its acquisition and sadly we lost trust in people who we had regarded highly. Nonetheless, you have completed your training and your graduation tonight is probably going to remain as one of the highlights of your career.

In the late 70's and mid 80" when I completed my MBChB and FCP(SA), respectively, the political climate was not conducive, and I did not attend either of my graduations. But more recently, I have served on the Senate of the CMSA and have proudly joined the procession on many occasions. At the start of the COVID pandemic, I was President of the College of Physicians and had the opportunity to engage in the discussions of the Senate of the CMSA regarding the viability of holding written and national clinical examinations during the various levels of lock down, when travel and gatherings were severely restricted.

The response of the CMSA was phenomenal and a huge collective effort led by the President, Deputy President, the CEO, the Director of Education and Assessment, the Academic Registrar, Presidents of the individual colleges, Senators, and Examiners of the CMSA culminated in a revised examination format, incorporating modern pedagogical principles, new virtual platforms and inclusivity.

For the first time, clinical examinations were decentralized and held at each of the nine training centres in the country as were the national zoom-based structured oral examinations. The quantum of effort invested in these examinations cannot be over-emphasised and a huge thank you is due to all those associated with the examinations, including the administrative staff at all the CMSA offices.

Madam President, I am proud to be part of the CMSA during this historic period. Taking an adverse situation and turning it into an outstanding success is truly a proudly South African tradition.

Amazingly, in addition to huge challenge and commitment, we also

saw the "human side" the CMSA. Many of you may have had COVID and the decentralization of the clinical examination allowed a little leeway to stagger the examinations and offer alternate dates for those affected.

A memorable example is that of a candidate who became infected just two days prior to her final examination after contact with an ill patient. In the pre-COVID era this would have meant that the candidate would have had to wait a further six months to sit the final examination. However, due to magnanimity of the CEO, Academic Registrar, administrative staff of the CMSA offices in Durban and the head of the Department of Medicine at UKZN, she managed to sit the examinations in an isolation ward with the CMSA Durban staff and Head of Department of Medicine as invigilators.

So where to from now? Many of you have now completed your training and will exit with your qualification. You are at the peak of your knowledge and the world is your oyster. In reaching for new goals and achievements, remember your roots and that you are a doctor first and foremost before being a specialist or subspecialist. Remember your community and the hardships they still endure and how you may positively impact their lives. Maintain the comradery and community spirit developed during difficult times which allowed us to overcome adversity and assist each other.

Finally, "Ukule uze ukhokoba" or "May you be blessed with a long life (until you bend over)".

My passion is geriatric medicine and my plea to you is to look beyond the numbers and treat the older patient with respect and care and avoid excluding them from treatment programs purely on age. Treat at them as you would your mothers and grandmothers and more importantly as you would like to be treated at that age. While we cannot prolong life, we should always strive to improve the quality and dignity of life.

I urge you to read two books "The Book of Joy by the Archbishop Desmond Tutu and the Dalai Lama" and "Beyond Mortal" by Atul Gawande.

Once again, congratulations on your wonderful achievement and best wishes for the future.

Madam Vice Chancellor, officials of Walter Sisulu University, President of the Colleges of Medicine of South Africa, Senators and members of constituent colleges of CMSA, officers of the CMSA, newly qualified fellows, diplomates, their families, ladies and gentleman.

It is a pleasure for us to host this ceremony at WSU, Eastern Cape for the first time in the life of the CMSA. This is a result of a collaborative and growing cordial relationship between our university at the CMSA. Over the past decade our processes for training specialists have become closely intertwined with the CMSA processes. This has been brought to bear by the promulgation of the new pathway

for specialisation issued by the HPCSA in 2010, which embedded specialist training in medicine firmly in the control of universities in this country. This has ensured uniform training and a single standardised exit examinations for each of the specialist qualification in the country through the CMSA which has been contracted by the HPCSA to provide this service. The successful completion of each examination step at the CMSA by Fellowship candidates allows the university to credit such candidate for relevant modules within that particular Master of Medicine discipline. Where the CMSA provides only an exit examination, the formative steps have to be fulfilled within the university. The program is supported by the National Department of Health, the DHET and the provincial department of health through funding for training posts on the clinical training platform. The clinical training platform is composed of various healthcare facilities in the province. The HPCSA accredits each facility allocating a unique training number for each trainee linked to a particular hospital. In return the university provides training through jointly appointed staff employed by the province at these facilities. The awarding of the Master of Medicine degree by the university to Fellows implies that they have gone through all assessments/examinations for what is termed the coursework of the degree and they have successfully passed the research/dissertation module.

I feel I should explain this as it sometimes confuses candidates and their supervisors, since we are coming from a pathway which prevailed prior to 2010 which was different from this one. The regulator will not allow any other path other than the promulgated pathway.

Walter Sisulu has steadily increased its output of medical specialist since the new pathway came into operation. The training platform was last evaluated in 2016 and is due for evaluation soon. What we hope for is that the upcoming evaluation will give us more training posts at relevant facilities, including adding more qualifications which we have applied to offer in the future.

It is pleasing to note that the majority of postgraduate trainees in medicine are drawn from graduates of the Walter Sisulu University. This supports the theory that the institution and the province is doing well in terms of retaining its medical graduates. We are seeing several of our graduates from the MB ChB program and the specialist training program entering practice at our healthcare facilities. This bodes well for the quality of health service for the local population. Most importantly, I hope that this will reduce bad clinical outcomes for the public. It is well known that as a province we are battling with a huge case load of lawsuits emanating from actual or perceived sub-standard patient care. It is my hope that the newly qualified specialist will add to the pool of medical experts who will assist the province to improve quality in patient care. It is my wish and hope that you will chose to remain in the public sector/or hospitals just as you mentors/trainers have chosen to remain in public service.

If you leave public service we take it as a loss to state sector. When you decide to relocate overseas it will be total loss to all of us. The investment which the public has made in you will not be realised. It has to be written off as a complete loss. Imagine if all of your trainers had decided to emigrate; you wouldn't have been able access the training that has made you a medical specialist today. So, I appeal to you to reconsider if this thought has crossed your mind. Please stay and improve our lives.

Let's talk about the soul of a scholar. So that we are on the same page, when we are talking about a scholar we are referring to a learned or well-educated person (isifundiswa), especially one who excels in a particular field or subject. A person who gets a master's degree like you, is an example of a scholar. The definition of soul in this instance refers to the emotional and intellectual energy or intensity, that you bring forth, especially as revealed in a work of art or an artistic performance. Why did I choose this theme? It is because you are your own work of art and your soul is gold. Therefore, you have to learn to nurture your soul.

Good evening to you all, and congratulations to all tonight's Diplomates, Fellows and Certificants. I am both honoured and humbled to be invited to address this prestigious admissions ceremony. Coming at a time when we are well into the third year of the most challenging global pandemic of modern times, we are all viewing our commitment to medicine, and the health and welfare of our populations, through an altered lens. As COVID-19 case numbers decrease globally, and public health and social measures are eased, we continue walking that very fine line between guarding against a resurgence, while allowing ailing economies a chance to begin their recovery.

Here in South Africa, President Cyril Ramaphosa ended the State of Emergency just weeks ago, after 750 days, declaring that "it is time to grow the economy and create jobs", and "get the country back on track". For all of you here tonight, however, battling the COVID-19 pandemic is an experience that will likely never be forgotten. In so-called normal circumstances, post-graduate specialization pushes you to the limits of your physical and mental capability. But the onset of the pandemic during your training has surely delivered some of the worst circumstances imaginable. What you have gained, however, are unique and invaluable skills and expertise that will ensure you are better prepared for future challenges – both professional and personal. That's important, because COVID-19 won't be the last health emergency we will face in Africa, or globally. And while the pandemic certainly laid bare the fragility of our health systems,

economies and societies, here in South Africa and across the continent, it also provided a valuable opportunity to address some of the systemic health gaps.

Primarily, COVID-19 highlighted the inextricable link between health and economic development in ways that will, going forward, make a difference in investment, worldwide ... forever. Similarly, the pandemic highlighted the equally inextricable link between health and other social and development sectors, with the poor bearing a disproportionate burden of the impacts, wherever in the world they live. Our work, as the medical profession, is about people. We have a responsibility, especially as scientists, to not only produce the brilliant tools that will improve health across the globe, but to clearly communicate the benefits of those tools to politicians, communities and ordinary citizens.

Former US President Donald Trump provided one of the most stark examples of the challenge of making politicians understand science when, in 2020, he suggested that inserting disinfectant into the bodies of coronavirus patients might help treat COVID-19. As scientists, and as medical professionals qualifying today, we need to always remain connected to the impact of what we do, what we produce, and what we work on ... how this is going to be deployed on the ground – regardless of our field of focus. As specialists specifically, you have an important role to play in training and supervising other cadres to, in the meantime, cover gaps that could take decades to close in Africa. In Zambia, for example, task-shifting due to doctor shortages has seen trained non-physicians, who deliver life-saving medical and surgical procedures, become the real backbone of surgical services in rural areas.

About four months into the pandemic in 2020, a journalist asked me how I keep going against the daunting oncoming tide. I responded, then, that I am encouraged by the positives. For COVID-19 specifically, two years later I am happy to be able to say that against the odds, including huge inequities that drastically delayed the rollout of our vaccine programmes in Africa, and continue today, we are weathering the storm with resilience and determination. As medical specialists, there will be countless times in the years ahead when I hope you take my advice to also tackle the challenges by looking for the positives.

Working in the medical field in Africa is not for the faint-hearted. With a very low only one healthcare worker per every 1000 people – less than half the set standard of 2.5 health workers per 1000 population required to provide basic health care, and further skewed by the rural-urban imbalance – a regular 40-hour work week is routinely accompanied by long hours of overtime. In South Africa, there are an average 16.5 specialists per 100 000 population, against a comparative number of well over 250 for Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) countries, and 365 in the United States.

Resilience, flexibility and adaptability, along with tenacity and deep commitment, are all critical. This is something to which health and development workers in Africa have had to become accustomed. From a very young age I learned this from the example of my own parents, who started their careers as young doctors running a general practice in a township in the then Transvaal. They went on to devote their lives to health care and policy. My family left South Africa for

Botswana when I was 11, to secure better educational prospects for myself and my siblings, and to escape hostile interactions with the apartheid police.

My father believed very strongly – as do I – in the power of education to transform people's lives. He came from an impoverished background and was lucky to get a scholarship to medical school. But he knew he had to act when the 1954 Bantu Education Act threatened to rob his children of the same education. In Botswana, my mother helped to introduce family planning services, while my father became the Smallpox Commissioner for Southern Africa. Part of a global team working to eradicate smallpox – which became a reality in 1979 – I remember him going away for weeks on end into the bush to provide clinical services to people in rural areas. However, while my parents, the situation in South Africa, and my school in Swaziland instilled in me an appreciation for social justice and education, my early plans certainly didn't include becoming a doctor. As a youngster, I wanted to chart my own path, away from the family business. I decided I wouldn't study medicine. Then, when I went to the University of London's Royal Free Hospital to pursue my medical degree, I said I wouldn't marry a doctor.

As it turned out, I did both!

Public health was also not my first choice, despite it being the focus of many discussions in my home growing up. After starting my career as a medical doctor, I had a small child and wanted to continue my studies to be a paediatrician. But since there was no medical school in Botswana, I would have had to leave her and my family for several years.

That is the short story about how I became a specialist in public health. Each year that I have worked in this field, my appreciation of global health has grown. Today, as the World Health Organization's first woman Regional Director in Africa, with 40 years of experience, including in the fields of HIV, tuberculosis, non-communicable diseases, Ebola, and now COVID-19, I am still inspired by the great value of preventive and community-based interventions. During my early years, working in tuberculosis wards and later in paediatrics in Botswana, I experienced first-hand the link between health and the social condition. Childhood malnutrition, for example, was driven by teenage motherhood and absent fathers. This was the real-life consequence of gender inequity, which was lethal for child malnutrition, as well as for HIV. HIV was my first epidemic, and the lessons I learned afforded me a better understanding of global health inequity, which played out, in this instance, in very different access to available treatment.

As with your experience with COVID-19, I'm sure, I felt helpless and furious – specifically regarding the lack of access to antiretrovirals, but more generally around the challenges posed by economic, social and cultural inequities driving the vulnerability of women and girls. At the same time, however, the solidarity between Western and African affected communities highlighted the power of partnerships, and of civil society – which has also been critical during the COVID-19 pandemic. The same is true of WHO's 3 by 5 Initiative, which aimed to provide antiretroviral treatment to people living with HIV and AIDS in developing and middle-income countries. This gave us lessons about adapting approaches to suit the circumstances, and cover gaps – like the Zambian example of task-shifting that I shared earlier



- which are still relevant today. Along with such task shifting, other lessons include the central role of primary health care in scaling up access, the imperative of decentralized health services, the value of partnerships, and the need for more investment in health.

The start of my first term as Regional Director for Africa was massively challenging, with Ebola ravaging three West African countries, and threatening the Region, and the world. But all these experiences meant that when COVID-19 arrived, I could meet it with a unique set of skills and expertise. I'd now like to share with you some of the learnings that have proved important in dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as with public health more broadly. The first is the critical link between health and politics, that I have already alluded to. On a slightly more optimistic note, if you compare the HIV story to that of COVID-19, in terms of political agency by African leaders, we have made great strides. There is definitely a different political dynamic happening now; what the African Union has been able to mobilize in response to COVID-19 is clear evidence of that. Next, we need to have resilient public health systems in place throughout countries, including the most remote parts. In practice, this means health systems that are properly equipped – with staff and resources - to continue delivering uninterrupted essential health services, even as they quickly detect and respond to health threats or emergencies. This capacity to identify and monitor risks is crucial for the early detection of the start of any outbreak. Ebola, for example, started in a remote area of Guinea, and so was able to spread quickly and quietly – unnoticed – among vulnerable communities.

Good Primary Health Care systems are also crucial for early detection of chronic non-communicable diseases. Screening for hypertension and diabetes, and some cancers, can significantly reduce deaths due to cardiovascular diseases - which kill Africans at much younger ages than people in other regions. At the same time, we must be able to switch on and quickly scale up health systems in an emergency. Investment to close and fill identified systemic gaps is needed before a pandemic hits.

This would reduce the necessity to pour in money when an emergency happens; the capacity to respond would already be in place. The importance of the private sector's role was certainly highlighted during the height of the HIV epidemic, and now with COVID-19, complementing the public sector and growing the overall health response. These partnerships will be critical going forward, in respect of manufacturing of vaccines and other tools, and will be key as South Africa advances towards National Health Insurance.

Technology, as an enabler during COVID-19, also gave us an important lesson in its valuable potential to cover gaps, and accelerate solutions. It has, for instance, been a powerful tool to connect health care workers in remote areas with expert clinicians in towns and cities, allowing for optimal treatment of patients on-site. Turning to the important issue of the interconnectness between diseases, Ebola illustrated the wider impact of improving people's health. When people were able to wash their hands more, and practice better hygiene, we were able to better control Ebola. But we also saw concurrent reductions in diseases such as cholera, for example.

This emphasizes the need to recognize the links between diseases,

including starting to overcome the barriers between “communicable” and noncommunicable diseases. This link has been clearly illustrated by COVID-19 and the underlying conditions that increase vulnerability to severe disease and death. It is also evident in the connections between hepatitis and liver cancer, and Human Papilloma Virus and cervical cancer. From an investment perspective, this suggests that much greater impact could be achieved with targeted funding for specific key areas, as opposed to the fragmented investment that remains common. A new approach of this nature would need to be incorporated into policy and action, reflecting the view that human health and well-being are materially interlinked with sustainable development. Many risks to health are influenced or even determined by policies in sectors other than health. Transitions in energy and transport, for instance, have multiple health co-benefits for environmental protection.

Another key sector responsible for policies that offer win-win situations for health includes safe drinking water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH). Overall, there remains an urgent need to be more effective in translating resources into good health care for the poor, as well as those better off. In the Southern African context and in countries like the United States and the United Kingdom, given their history, these are overwhelmingly black people.

In South Africa, the challenges to equity and solidarity are something of a microcosm of what we've experienced in the inequitable global response to COVID-19. This saw richer countries stockpile vaccines in the early stages of the pandemic, effectively cutting off the access of multinational platforms like the COVAX Facility and the African Union's AVATT. In effect, this meant African countries could not protect their citizens from infection.

A recent article highlighting the relationship between the COVID-19 pandemic and inequality in South Africa, published by Wits University, highlights the severe domestic inequality between the private and public hospital systems.

With 80% of the population having no medical insurance, and the other insured 20% accounting for half of all health care spending, lack of access to health care is driven by income inequality. Research by the Discovery Foundation in 2019 tells us that, in South Africa, there are only seven specialists per 100 000 population in the public sector, against 69 per 100 000 population in the private sector. Addressing inequity in health in South Africa has been a longstanding effort.

When I delivered, virtually, the second Bongani Mayosi Memorial Lecture at the University of Cape Town earlier this year, I stressed that Africa needs scientists, medical professionals, nurses, care workers, institutions and infrastructure capable of delivering African solutions to African health care challenges. WHO in Africa's stance aligns firmly with the late Professor Mayosi's belief that there is a need to “grow our own timber”. This philosophy emphasises excellence, while nurturing and mentoring people with potential – especially women, in order to create a pipeline of future African doctors, scientists and researchers. All of you here today are part of that pipeline, and that gives me confidence that we will indeed be able to achieve Universal Health Coverage for our continent. Surgery, for example, has an essential role to play here, cutting across all aspects of health. It has the capacity to save millions of lives every year, while allowing many

more millions to live free from disability and chronic disease.

The economic impact of surgical inequity also makes surgical services essential in achieving UHC. Every year, millions of people in Africa face catastrophic financial expenditure while seeking access to surgery. Forced to choose between their health and their financial security, many forego treatment rather than face financial ruin. The challenges are daunting. But I hope that, like me, you will find inspiration in many unexpected places - especially among your hardworking colleagues who continue enthusiastically, despite the challenges.

It is truly humbling to witness the many sacrifices made by health workers in the interest of the greater good. Going forward in your careers, I urge you to maintain your relationships with those who are your biggest supporters. For me, this has been a fail-safe confidence builder that began with my parents, who were incredible role models. Today, it is my husband, children, siblings and family, friends, and colleagues.

Make sure to stay in touch with family and loved ones, with your friends and mentors. Their support will be a lifeline. Congratulations once again to each and every one of you, and thank you to the Colleges of Medicine of SA for this honour.

By Asking more: How can I make a difference compared to: What can you all do for me! By having a vision - have a purpose – what do I want to do! What do I want to achieve? Where do I want to end up? Did not look for excuses. Look for reasons, alternatives, and solutions – you applied your mind, stood up– took responsibility.

And for that we celebrate with you!

In January 2020 before COVID I said to the first year MBChB class at their welcoming function - Be **RESILIENT**

**R= Resilience**

The capacity to recover quickly from difficulties; toughness. New environment, new challenges. Using 7 key matters in your action: Competence, confidence, connection, character, contribution, coping, and control. And the 5 Pillars: Self-awareness, mindfulness, self-care, positive relationships and purpose.

**E= Energy**

To keep a balance. Do not drain all your energy. Manage your energy levels

**S= Student**

Focus is to be a Postgraduate student. Ask questions in your environment. Become a researcher.

**P= Patience**

Quality things take time. Do your own thing. Listen and learn but take responsibility.

**E= Emotional Control**

Less of yourself. More of others. Expect less – give more

**C= Communication**

Nobody can read your thoughts. Talk. Tell. Open up.

**T= Tolerance and Thankful Tolerance**

I really plead with you to be tolerant. We live in a society that has limited tolerance-. Being Thankful:

That gives you RESPECT - and how profounding did that words become. After this speech we had COVID19 and I am sure if they listened, they had the means to deal with their challenges. This is probably also true for you. Have RESPECT for Life, for your Patients, Lecturers, Fellow students and your Colleagues.

But for you there was no such motivation. But you did it. And for that we are thankful! And then COVID19 hit us hard. And especially you that studied. Therefore it is more important that we celebrate your achievement despite the impact of COVID19 on your studies. Well done.

Oprah Winfrey who said "Be thankful for what you have; you'll end up having more. If you concentrate on what you don't have, you will never, ever have enough."

Jackson Brown once said "Nothing is more expensive than a missed opportunity."

"Purpose is when you know and understand what you were born to accomplish. Vision is when you can see it in your mind by faith and begin to imagine it."

I need to also thank also the academic that was part of your journey, support you and ensure to you did make this important goal in your life. In ending there are two matters I want to address:

The footprint of the CMSA in Central South Africa and your well-being.

CMSA: Today is a very important day. Privilege to be here and more so to celebrate with you also the first solid footprint of CMSA. My appreciation to all involved including the Senate for their hard work. Over the last two years we have been working hard collectively to establish a footprint for the College in Bloemfontein. Collectively we have succeeded. We have now a permanent space for the College and also a permanent footprint as well as having examination in Bloemfontein. I am sure all will benefit from this new arrangement – College, Faculty, staff, academics, registrars and postgraduate students. Well done to all and thank you. Thank you to Prof Senkubuge, Prof Fagan, Prof Buch and the Board and Senate for making this dream come true. But also thank you to my team for their efforts! Also something to celebrate!

Your well-being: The Healthcare Workers Care Network (HWCN) has found that 82% of the SA doctors, nurses and allied health professionals using its counselling services believe there is a stigma attached to healthcare workers asking for help with their own mental health. I quote: "The network was set up early in the pandemic by a number of healthcare professional bodies, anticipating the added stresses on healthcare workers and aiming to provide mental health support through a 24-hour helpline and online counselling, individual and group support and training. The services have reached almost 5 000 healthcare workers since April 2020, with an average of 175 calls to the helpline per month. A recent survey of the healthcare workers who used the services revealed high levels of reluctance to seek help for mental health challenges, and the reasons why. For 80% of the healthcare workers, fear of judgement by colleagues, managers and their profession was the main reason for being unwilling to seek or delaying finding support for their mental health concerns. They fear being seen as incompetent, weak and unfit to do their jobs because

of expectations that healthcare workers should be more resilient and better equipped than the general public to deal with work stress and manage their own mental health."

This is a perception we need to change and work collectively to change the working environment – our working environment. We need to care about the most valuable asset in our system- our professionals. Richard Branson said, "Colleagues should take care of each other, have fun, celebrate success, learn by failure, look for reasons to praise not to criticize, communicate freely and respect each other."

## Honorary Fellowship of the Colleges of Medicine of SA (CMSA) Dr Matshidiso Moeti

Dr Matshidiso Rebecca Natalie Moeti is elected and awarded the highest honour of the CMSA, the Honorary Fellowship of The Colleges of Medicine of South Africa (CMSA). The Honorary Fellowship recognises amongst others, achievement of the highest order in the person's fields of endeavour by persons in South Africa or globally.

Dr Matshidiso Rebecca Natalie Moeti is the first woman to be elected as the World Health Organization's (WHO) Regional Director for Africa. She has devoted most of her life to battling poverty and inequality, striving to realize her vision of securing health and well-being for all Africa's people, regardless of age, socio-economic status, or geographic location.

A medical doctor and public health expert with more than 40 years of national and international experience, Dr Moeti admits to having little early interest in medicine, despite growing up with two parents devoted to health care and policy. That all changed, however, and this powerhouse advocate for Universal Health Care obtained her Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery from the Royal Free Hospital School of Medicine of the University of London in 1978, then a Master of Science in Community Health for Developing Countries, from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, in 1986. Amongst a long list of key achievements, Dr Moeti is renowned for having led WHO's "3 by 5" Initiative in Africa at the height of the HIV/AIDS epidemic, changing the face of access to antiretroviral therapy among people living with HIV. By empowering nurses to prescribe ARVs, her work helped to shift HIV from a death sentence to a chronic illness in Africa.

In leading WHO's work in Africa since 2015, tremendous progress has been made. Wild poliovirus was kicked out of Africa in 2020 – the second disease to be eradicated from the Region, after smallpox 40 years ago. Dr Moeti has also driven a groundbreaking Transformation Agenda, to make the organization more effective, results-driven and accountable. It is being successfully implemented, producing numerous innovations that have improved the programmatic and management performance of WHO in the African Region. The Agenda has also been recognized by the United Nations Joint Inspection Unit, among others, for best practices recommended for other UN agencies to consider adopting.

Leading investments in areas such as surveillance, training, innovation, community engagement and partnerships have improved countries' capacity to prepare for and respond to the around 100 acute health emergencies that occur in the Region annually. This resulted in faster, better coordinated and more effective response to outbreaks like Ebola. She has also led a robust response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Other key achievements include overseeing the development, adoption, and implementation of a strategy to mitigate the impact of climate change on health and making significant progress towards Universal Health Coverage through primary health care. These efforts saw the UHC index of country progress increase in the African Region from 46 in 2017 to 48 in 2019 (compared to a global average of 66 in 2017 and 2019).

Dr Moeti is also a great champion for women in leadership in global health and has launched a partnership with the UN Volunteers programme to recruit 100 young women from the global south as the next generation of health leaders. Under her leadership, WHO in Africa has additionally rolled out several interventions to improve leadership skills, build confidence, and empower women to go after roles that reflect their capacity.

Prior to joining WHO in 1999, Dr Moeti worked with the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) as Team Leader of the Africa and Middle East Desk in Geneva; with the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) as Regional Health Advisor for East and Southern Africa; and with Botswana's Ministry of Health as a clinician and public health specialist. After joining WHO's Africa Regional Office, she has served as Deputy Regional Director, Assistant Regional Director, Director of Noncommunicable Diseases, WHO Representative for Malawi, Coordinator of the Inter-Country Support Team for the South and East African countries, and Regional Advisor for HIV/AIDS, before being elected to the top WHO job on the continent.



In recognition of her excellent service to humanity, Dr Moeti has received accolades including an Honorary Fellowship from the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, an Honorary Doctor of Science from the University of Health and Allied Sciences in Ghana, Honoris Causa Doctorate by Instituto de Higiene e Medicina Tropical Universidade NOVA de Lisboa, was named a COVID-19 Heroine by Ellen Johnson Sirleaf President Center for Women, and among the Women of 2020 by the Financial Times. Most recently, she was honoured with Membership of the United States National Academy of Medicine and Special Recognition for African health leadership on COVID-19 from AMREF Health Africa and received a Global Health Equity Award from the Africa-American Institute.

For her sustained, outstanding, and life-changing contributions to the health of the people of Africa, it is with great pleasure that Dr Matshidiso Moeti is awarded admission as an Honorary Fellow of the Colleges of Medicine of South Africa.

## Honorary Fellowship of the College of Pathologists in Virology Professor Salim Abdool Karim



*Professor Abdool-Karim*

Professor Abdool-Karim is an international authority in public medicine and the College of Pathologists would like to recognize his exceptional, consistent and impactful scientific knowledge generation as well as his national and international scientific leadership in virology.

As a community medicine specialist, Prof Abdool-Karim is exceptional in having published over 400 peer review scientific journal articles in his lifetime. Most of these scientific outputs are in pathology and published in many disciplines of pathology including molecular biology, immunology, infectious diseases, microbiology with 204(51%) of these publications in the field of virology. This impressive academic productive record matches, and in many instances exceeds the outputs of some the most prolific publishing virologists globally.

Prof Abdool-Karim has a World of Science H-index of 66, an indication of his high scientific productivity and the impact of his publications. He is a regular publisher in high impact generalist journals such as the Lancet, the New England Journal of Medicine, Science and Nature. However, the most notable academic outputs are those published in specialist immunology, virology and microbiology journals which constitute more than half his current career publications.

While Prof Abdool-Karim has many notable contributions to scientific knowledge generation in pathology, the most impactful of these is the formulation and testing of the microbicide gel for the prevention of HIV transmission. As a public intervention, this simple intervention has the potential to change the natural history of the HIV pandemic

which has evaded multiple scientific concerted efforts to date.

In both the ongoing HIV and COVID-19 pandemics, Prof Abdool-Karim has been responsive and agile to the call for effective scientific leadership to partner with politicians and guide the scientific public decision making and policy formulation. He was recently appointed Chair of the Ministerial Advisory Committee on COVID-19 and steered the navigation of the country through the first and second waves of the COVID-19 pandemic. Before COVID, he was involved and chaired many HIV/AIDS and TB scientific committees nationally and internationally.

Professor Abdool-Karim's leadership extend beyond pandemics to leadership of many scientific entities and programmes. He has been the Director of the Centre for AIDS Programme of Research in South Africa (CAPRISA) since 2002. He holds a number of honorary senior positions in South Africa and in the USA. In South Africa he is a Pro Vice-Chancellor at the University of KwaZulu Natal (since 2016), honorary Director of the DST-NRF Centre of excellence in HIV Prevention (since 2015) and honorary director of the MRC HIV-TB Pathogenesis and Treatment Research Unit (since 2014). His leadership positions in the USA include CAPRISA

Professor of Global Health, Department of Epidemiology, Columbia University Professor with tenure(since 2016), Honorary Associate, Ragon Institute of Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH), Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and Harvard University(since 2011), Adjunct Professor in Immunology and Infectious Diseases (since 2019), Harvard University Honorary Adjunct Professor, Clinical Epidemiology and Health Services Research, Graduate School of Medical Sciences, Cornell University, New York and Honorary Adjunct Professor of Medicine, Weill Medical College, Cornell University, New York(since 2005)

Professor Abdool-Karim scientific contribution has been recognized through the many awards and fellowships bestowed to him. He is the recipient of 25 national and international awards. Those awards relevant to his virology contribution include the Institute of Human Virology Lifetime award, the Medical Research Council Lifetime Platinum Award, the Biomedical HIV Prevention Forum Distinguished Award, the President's Award for Outstanding Achievement in the World Health, the Hero in Medicine Award from the International Association of Physicians for AIDS Care (IAPAC), the US Science and Technology Pioneers Prize for the microbicide gel.

Professor Abdool-Karim is a member or fellow of sixteen national

## Addressing Bullying of Doctors in Training A Culture Challenge that Needs to be Urgently Addressed

Bullying of doctors in training has been well described in the literature for decades, yet the prevalence remains high. Mistreatment can be defined as “remarks, actions or behaviours that are perceived to be unwanted, hurtful, upsetting or coercive in nature”.<sup>1</sup> High levels of psychological distress amongst junior doctors is also well documented and has been attributed to workload and working conditions, and toxic work cultures that include abuse, sexism, racism, tendencies of blaming and shaming, lack of support, stigma and a perceived need to appear invulnerable.<sup>2</sup> Bullying, especially in medical settings, is associated with hierarchy, and is often considered to be an ingrained culture that has arguably become accepted as part of the training of junior doctors and registrars.<sup>3</sup>

Numerous international studies have shown that bullying in medical training is a widespread problem that most often goes unreported.<sup>4</sup> A recent systematic review found that 30% to 95% of junior doctors are affected by workplace bullying.<sup>5</sup> The review showed that those who are younger are more prone to experience mistreatment, and perpetrators of bullying are most frequently consultants. This supports the theory of hierarchical abuse; those who are younger are likely to be lower on the lower rungs of power structures.<sup>1</sup> Similarly, a survey of junior doctors in Ireland found that rates of stress, anxiety and depression were higher in junior doctors in comparison to consultants.<sup>6</sup> Women are also more likely to report incidents of mistreatment, and factors such as ethnicity, nationality, physical height and clinical speciality may also predispose to bullying.<sup>4,5</sup> Normalisation of bullying behaviours, fear of reprisal, time consuming reporting procedures, doubt of change as a result of reporting and lack of knowledge of reporting systems are reasons mistreatment often goes unreported.<sup>4,7</sup>

South Africa is no exception to the worldwide problem. In 2016, Yumna Moosa brought the issues to light when she reported her case within South African social media and highlighted her experience of intern mistreatment.<sup>8</sup> She described overt sexual and racial abuse by a senior at a public hospital. The documentary, *Behind the Frontline*, revealed various forms of discrimination and harassment

experienced by South African doctors, as well as the mental health implications.<sup>9</sup> A recent South African study conducted over all psychiatric training facilities in the country found that 48.6% of psychiatry registrars reported experiencing bullying during their specialist training; a discipline which would be assumed to be more cognisant and sensitive to these issues.<sup>10</sup>

Some postulate that junior doctors may ‘misinterpret’ attempts by their seniors to improve performance as bullying behaviour, and some consider these behaviours to be assistive tools in medical education.<sup>11,12</sup> These theories are concerning especially when considering the detrimental and far-reaching effects of bullying. Victims not only report high levels of psychiatric distress, poor career satisfaction, and reduced clinical ability, but admit to an inability to focus, loss of confidence and sleep disturbances.<sup>4,5</sup> Those who are affected associate these experiences with poor decision making and medical errors. The exposure to bullying in the workplace is also predictive of the onset of depression and burnout.<sup>13</sup> This is extremely worrisome, especially when compounded with the stress of working in an already demanding environment that may not be perceived as supportive.

Training in resilience is important in medical schools to equip junior doctors with coping mechanisms to deal with their lengthy and challenging studies, as well as the repeated exposure to patient and family distress, disability and death. These strategies involve developing realistic expectations of the healthcare environment, self-care, stress management as well as time management. While resilience bolstering of junior doctors is important in helping them navigate challenging work environments, workplace bullying should not be occurring in the first place. Concerted organisational change is required to address the root causes and to foster supportive and compassionate work spaces.

Solutions that should be considered by medical institutions include:

### 1. Promotion of anti-bullying policies

Medical faculties and health care facilities should endorse anti-bullying policies that promote a healthy and safe working environment. The American Medical Association adopted such a policy in 2020 that defines expected and prohibited behaviours and outlines clear reporting systems.<sup>14</sup> South African medical faculties and health care facilities can adopt similar guidelines.

### 2. Education to prevent academic bullying

All doctors, regardless of seniority, should be made aware of the evidence for the prevalence and impact of mistreatment. Doctors should be able to identify incidents of bullying and have awareness



of reporting systems. Education on bullying can be in the form of presentations or discussions, and medical journals should be open to publishing articles on the topic. A notable example that has recently taken place in South Africa is the anti-bullying campaign implemented at the University of Kwa-Zulu Natal under the leadership of the Dean, Prof Ncoza Dlova. This has included workshops, poster dissemination, as well as a webinars on academic bullying. The webinars will continue on an annual basis to accommodate new staff and students, have been approved by Human Resources department, and include clear reporting guidelines. Another example is the anti-bullying poster awareness campaign, led by Prof Soraya Seedat, Dr Maryke Hewett, Carine Visagie, and Ronel Bester, that was endorsed by the South African Committee of Medical Deans (SACOMD), launched at both Stellenbosch and Kwa-Zulu Natal universities, in the latter half of 2021 (see figure 1). This poster campaign has involved a wide distribution of anti-bullying posters in hospitals, clinics and lecture halls and has been promoted on various social media platforms. Posters have also been generously shared with all the 10 medical school deans however some have yet to implement the campaign.

### 3. Reporting systems with proactive responses

Reporting systems need to be established and formally communicated. The option for privacy and anonymity must also be offered. An example that has recently been established in South Africa is the online reporting system for staff and students that was established at Stellenbosch University (<https://ciims.sun.ac.za/ReportingPage/>).

Clear steps with a concise timeline to address the complaints need to be outlined and appropriate disciplinary actions should be established. The US National Health Institute established a policy of removing grants of those with validated reports of bullying. 15 In addition, the UK Wellcome Trust has also been known to withdraw funding accordingly. 16 Professional medical organisations (e.g. Colleges of Medicine of South Africa [CMSA], South African Medical Association [SAMA]) can also implement policies of suspending or removing perpetrators of mistreatment from their groups. 17

### 4. Support for victims

The links between bullying and adverse mental health effects underscore the need to provide prompt and sufficient psychological support for those who are affected. Academic hospitals and institutions should be aware of the need, and counselling and support groups should be provided for those affected. Support for those wishing to maintain anonymity should also be considered, for example anonymous online support forums. Building an anti-bullying culture is imperative to establishing a supportive environment for those affected. The University of Kwa-Zulu Natal has been an example of this where staff and students have been encouraged to speak freely about academic bullying and acknowledged for speaking out.

### 5. Assistance for perpetrators

Explanations for bullying behaviour are likely multifactorial, and studies show that work-related and organisational factors play a role. 18 It has also been shown that previous victimisation of bullying is a strong predictor of being a perpetrator. 19 This calls for consideration that perpetrators of bullying may also require psychological support to deal with past traumas and to develop coping mechanisms to manage in their stressful work environment.

Employee Assistance Program services could be utilised for this purpose.

Further research is required to fully define the problem in South Africa; however, based on current international and national data there is no doubt that we should all be very concerned. Bullying is wholly unacceptable and should not be tolerated. It is our collective responsibility as a medical fraternity to root it out. It is encouraging that some South African medical institutions have implemented anti-bullying prevention and support strategies, and these must serve as an example to others. However most academic hospitals and institutions require urgent review of reporting systems and interventions, and a culture shift in our medical education system is needed right now.

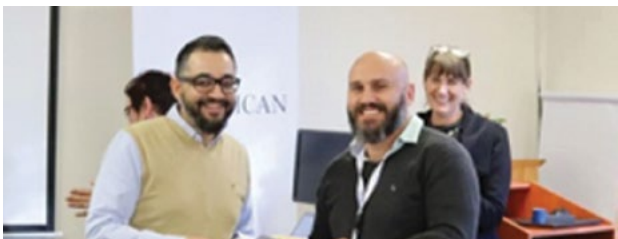

## The Diploma HIV Management(SA) 2022 Evaluation

### BACKGROUND - EXAMINATION STRUCTURE Diploma HIV Management(SA)

The Diploma in HIV Management is offered as an outcome assessment by the College of Family Physicians, under the CMSA. It is usually written twice a year (Feb/March and July/Aug) and is not linked to a specific university or training course. Its focus is the knowledge and understanding of the management of the patient with HIV in the primary, CHC, GP and district hospital setting. Candidates are expected to facilitate their own learning, both whilst seeing patients and through reading and studying.

Originally the Diploma consisted of both a long answer written paper, an "OSCE" paper and a MCQ. This methodology of assessment could not assess the breadth of the knowledge needed to be confident in management of patients with HIV. To ensure the exam has a high level of validity and reliability, it has been converted to two high quality MCQ papers.

Paper 1: Case based MCQs

Paper 2: Includes media such as X-rays, photographs, charts, results etc.

To assist candidates in preparing for their exam, the Diploma of HIV Management working group has created a curriculum based on 27 Entrustable Professional Activities (EPAs). All MCQs have been set according to the learning objectives captured in these EPAs. The exam MCQs are selected to cover the breadth of the curriculum.

### THE DIP HIV MAN(SA) ROADMAP

To assist candidates in preparing for the diploma of HIV Management, Dr Madeleine Muller facilitated the creation of a "roadmap" of weekly study tasks.

The Diploma in HIV Management MCQ working group has developed learning objectives for each of the 27 EPAs over the past two years, with relevant resources. These have been used to ensure MCQs cover the entire curriculum, but is also an excellent resource for candidates needing to prepare for the exam. The 27 EPAs was divided into a 9 week "study program" for candidates to follow.

### THE DIP HIV MAN(SA) STUDY GROUP

All candidates that enrolled for the Dip HIV Man(SA) was encouraged to sign up for the study group. A 128 of the 154 candidates that wrote the exam joined.

The interactions simply consisted of weekly email packs with the learning objectives for 2-3 relevant EPAs, resources, teaching materials and encouragement.

### EVALUATION

61 doctors filled in the evaluation form.

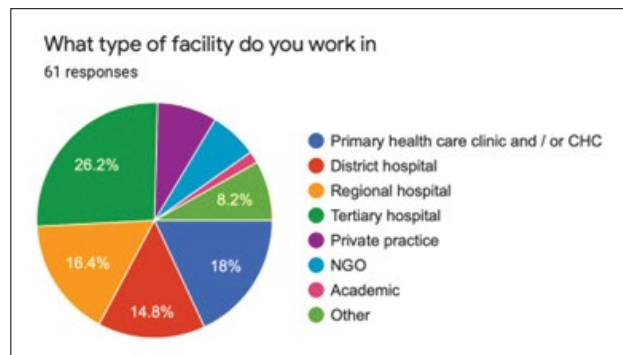
For 95.1% of the candidates, this was their first attempt at the exam. For 3 doctors it was their 2nd attempt.

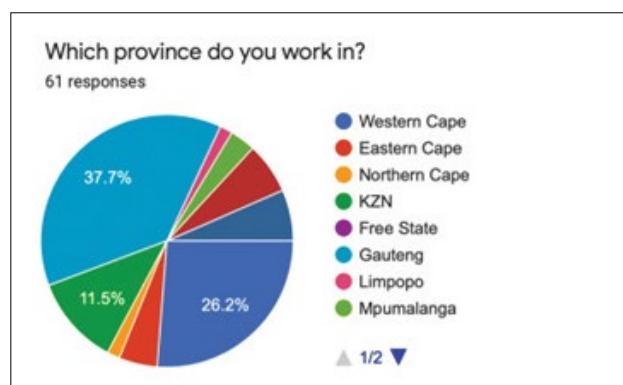

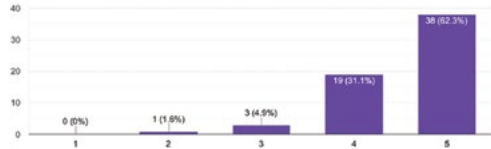

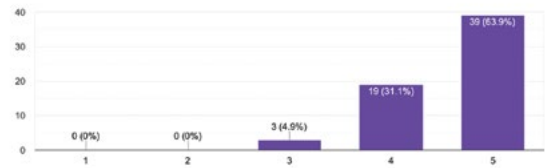




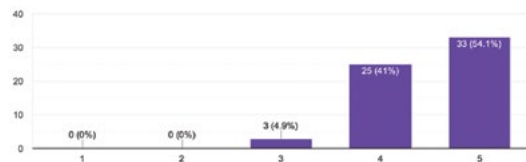
Please rate the usefulness of the learning objectives to your learning (the learning topics listed in the EPA's that was sent out on a weekly basis).

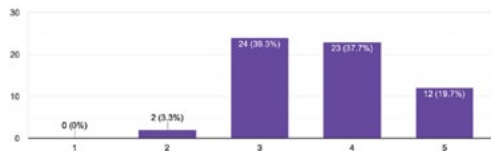
Overall, how would you rate the DipHIVMan support program?

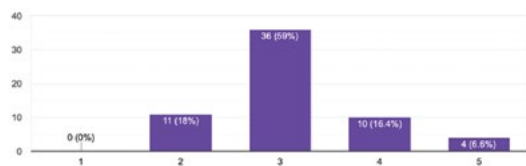
Please rate the quality of the weekly resource packs that were sent out on a weekly basis

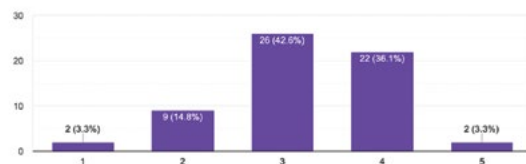
This course was structured over 9 weeks. How did you find the weekly work load in preparing for the Diploma of HIV Management?

## Obituaries



### **DR WILLEM LAUBSCHER**

#### *Urologist*

Willem Marthinus Lötter Laubscher was born in Observatory, Cape Town, on 1 February 1929. He passed away on 19 January 2021, two weeks before his 92nd birthday.

He was nationally and internationally renowned for operating famous politicians during the apartheid-era including Nelson Mandela and PW Botha. After retirement in 2003 he obtained a law degree. In February 2020 "Operation Mandela" by Willem Laubscher was published. It was regarded as 1 of 10 best books published in South Africa in 2020.

Willem Laubscher matriculated at Maitland High in 1944. He obtained his MBChB (UCT) in 1951, did his intern year at Grey Hospital, King Williams Town, became a GP at Joubertina in the Eastern Cape and then left for Britain in 1953.

He obtained FRCS (Edin) in 1958. He furthered his studies in Britain at the Leeds General Infirmary from 1958 until 1960. His tutors were the famous Leslie Pyrah and Fred Raper. In January 1961 Laubscher was appointed a clinical assistant at Karl Bremer Hospital, (KBH) Bellville. He registered as Urologist and opened practice as the first Urologist in the Western Transvaal at Klerksdorp in April 1962. He returned to Cape Town in 1967 to commence private practice at Medipark, Foreshore, later Louis Leipoldt Hospital in Bellville and ended his career as Urologist at Vergelegen Mediclinic, Somerset West. He took part-time appointments at KHB and Tygerberg Hospital (TBH), Woodstock and 2 Military Hospitals.

I have known Willem Laubscher closely since 1970 in our 5th year as medical students. Willem became snow-white grey at the age of 29 and obtained the nickname "silwer jakkals" or "silver fox". His session as part-time consultant at TBH was on Monday mornings. Dr Laubscher was willing to travel from Rondebosch to TBH to do a ward round at 07h15. He was an excellent teacher with vast clinical

experience. However, this was paired with his exceptional abilities as a surgeon. Amongst his fortes were kidney surgery (in the era before ultrasound, CT, shockwave lithotripsy and endourology). However, later he was one of the first to practice percutaneous nephro-lithotomies in private practice. His other forte was pediatric urological surgery. In this respect he also was a master and brilliant teacher. My personal abilities regarding most of the above I learned from Willem Laubscher.

Due to Dr Laubscher, I obtained a post at Leeds General Infirmary in 1979. During a visit from him that year it was a privilege to accompany him in looking up his old tutor, Leslie Pyrah. This connection with Leeds enabled another 5 newly qualified urologists from our department at TBH to spend a year at the Leeds General Infirmary. I still remember Dr Laubscher's words before I left for England: "My son, even if you don't learn a single fact, at least you will get rid of your blinkers".

Laubscher played an active role in SAMA and the South African Urological Association. He was President of the latter from 1986 – 1990. He delivered the first Guy de Klerk memorial lecture in 1991.

Willem Laubscher was a keen sportsman and had season rugby tickets on the main pavilion at Newlands for as long as I knew him. His membership at Kelvin Grove made his Newlands visits always extra special.

Inherited chiefly from his first wife Audrey, his children and some grandchildren became excellent swimmers even representing South Africa. In this regard his visions and administrative abilities enabled him to be elected as President of Western Province Swimming Union.

Despite a few serious health setbacks in the earlier and later years of his life he managed to overcome and recover from each. Six weeks before he passed away, he was still able to walk 5km a day to fetch his newspaper (Die Burger) at the roadside shop at Betty's Bay. However, the fittest part of his body till the end of his lengthy journey was his sharp brain. He will be regarded, remembered and missed by his family, friends, colleagues and all who have met him with the greatest respect, appreciation and admiration.

I was honored to make a speech of appreciation on his 75, 80, 85 and 90th birthdays. However, in the future, even in his absence, the 1st of February will be Willem Laubscher's Day for many of us. He leaves his current wife, three sons, a daughter and eight grandchildren. It is with regret that we must greet you, but well done Mr Laubscher.

**PROFESSOR D.J.V. WEICH**

*MChB(Stellenbosch), MMed(UFS), DM(UFS), FRCP(London),  
FACCP(USA)*

*19/12/1940 – 29/11/2021*

Professor Dirk Johannes Visser Weich qualified as a medical doctor in 1958 from the University of Stellenbosch. After graduating, he started his medical career as a general practitioner in Barkley East. In 1967 he enrolled as a medical officer at Tshilidzini Mission Hospital. Thereafter he spent the time of 1968-1969 as a general practitioner in Malmesbury. He decided in 1970 to come to the newly established Medical Faculty of the University of the Free State as a registrar in Internal Medicine. In 1973 Prof Weich was one of the first four (4) MMed students from the Medical Faculty who were successful in their exams.

After completing his studies, he joined Department Internal Medicine where he developed a keen interest in pulmonology. In 1975 he went to the pulmonology unit in Midhurst England to further his knowledge and clinical skills in Pulmonology. After his return the Division Pulmonology soon became one of the most renowned units of respiratory care in South Africa.

After the retirement of Professor D Meyer as head of Department Internal Medicine Professor D Weich was appointed as head of the department in 1981.

In the nineties he started a geriatric medicine service with outreach to many of the old age homes in the Mangaung area. When Professor Weich retired as head of the department in 1998, he remained in the department to service underprivileged communities with his interest in geriatric medicine. He identified the need for a place of safety for the needy aged population in Mangaung, which led to the renovation of a suitable building, and with the support of the UFS it was converted into the Omega Old Age Home. This project was an important outreach project of Department Internal Medicine in collaboration with the UFS and was a sought-after training platform for both undergraduate- and postgraduate students. When funds dried up Department Internal Medicine sadly had to cease their involvement in the running of Omega Old Age Home. Under his guidance the Boikutso Old Age Home was also established and in 1991 he was honoured by the Mangaung Society for the Care of the Aged with a symbolic blanket, traditional Basotho hat and walking stick.

In 1995 Professor Weich worked for a year as a senior consultant in geriatric medicine at St Mary's Hospital, Boston, England.

After his retirement in 1998 as Head of Department Internal Medicine he moved to England in 2001 and was appointed as senior specialist and head of geriatric medicine in Newport, Isle of Wight, England until 2006.

On his return from England in 2007 he started private practice in Somerset West and remained active in the practice until 2017.

Professor Weich was a keen researcher, published widely, and supported many post-graduate students with dissertations from honours - to doctorate level.

During his time as head of the Department Internal Medicine he endeavoured to improve cooperation especially between the English-speaking Medical Universities in South Africa and the Colleges of Medicine of SA to further medical education in Southern Africa. He was also instrumental in the hosting of the first South African Colleges of Medicine examinations in Bloemfontein in 1986. Under his leadership and vision Department Internal Medicine was a trendsetter in the training of registrars from all population groups from early on.

Professor Weich greatest passion was teaching. He was an astute clinician and many of us still remember his clinical skills and the emphasis he placed on the time with the patient to elicit all the aspects of the history and clinical signs. As a doctor, he treated all patients with dignity and respect. He will be remembered for the after-hours pulmonology clinic, which he started to allow patients who had trouble during normal working hours to come to the hospital to attend the pulmonology clinic. On many occasions, the clinic was still going on after 22h30 with Professor Weich still attending to his patients.

Professor Weich never lost his passion for general medicine and was in charge of the Monday firm for Department Internal Medicine at Pelonomi Hospital for many years. Due to his empathy for the plight of patients coming from far away, he campaigned for equal facilities at Pelonomi Hospital. He in fact stated that Pelonomi Hospital must have better facilities than Universitas Hospital to allow patients to be diagnosed and treated with the least inconvenience to them and their families. To achieve this, he was instrumental in the planning and running of a designated outpatient facility at Pelonomi Hospital so that his vision of a one-stop clinic with all the facilities housed in one building could become a reality. The finished outpatient complex was his pride and joy, and he took great pleasure in taking visitors to Pelonomi Hospital to show off the services rendered at the outpatient complex.

The following words from someone who trained and served under Prof Weich as an undergraduate student, intern, registrar, and consultant summarizes the legacy of Professor Dirk Weich perfectly: "As the head of the Internal Medicine department at the FS medical school, he made a huge impact on many registrars and medical students. His devotion and long hours spent on training and grooming of students will never be forgotten. He conveys the knowledge of medicine next to the bedside, and more important, he also taught us the art of medicine and the passion of medicine. His special efforts to improve elderly people's health and circumstances across all ethnic groups will be one of his special legacies that he left behind."

The Department of Internal Medicine honours his legacy as an excellent teacher, an astute clinician and a renowned researcher for his mentorship and example as the epitome of a caring physician.

The Department of Internal Medicine, the School of Clinical Medicine and the Faculty of Health Sciences would like to offer their deepest condolences to Margot, Helmuth, Stephan, Dirk, Saretjie and all his friends with their loss.



### DR KGOPOTSO RUDOLF MONONYANE

The College of Anaesthetists (CASA) and the Colleges of Medicine of South Africa (CMSA), have learned of the sad news of the passing of Dr Kgopotso Rudolf Mononyane, on the 21st January 2021. Dr Mononyane and a specialised intensive care retrieval team were travelling to a Durban hospital on a mercy flight when their helicopter crashed. They were on a mission to collect a critically ill Covid-19 patient for extracorporeal membrane support. The accident claimed the lives of all five people on board (including the pilot).

Dr Mononyane, an Anaesthesiologist, born in Hammanskraal, North of Pretoria, received his undergraduate and postgraduate training at the University of the Witwatersrand. He graduated with a B Pharm in 1998 and an MBBCh in the year 2002. He did his registrar training at the Witwatersrand University circuit from 2006, obtaining the Fellowship of the College of Anaesthetists, FCA (SA), in 2009. He worked as a specialist at Chris Hani Baragwanath Hospital between 2009 and 2012, leaving for full-time private practice in Johannesburg in 2013. He remained involved in training as a private practitioner. He furthered his training and experience in Airway Management, Regional Anaesthesia, Cardiothoracics and Transplant Anaesthesia, building himself up to become an expert in these subdisciplines of Anaesthesia. Dr Mononyane was working at the Milpark Hospital Cardiac Unit and Wits Donald Gordon Medical Centre Transplant Unit at the time of his death. He was widely respected as a hard-working, committed individual, with scarce skills and capabilities, who worked with great passion and enthusiasm.

He was a committed Part I examiner in the College of Anaesthetists for over a decade. His pharmacy background fuelled his love for physiology and pharmacology. He was also involved in numerous training initiatives for upskilling Anaesthetists locally, in outlying areas and in other African countries as far afield as Mauritius, for Anaesthetic skills such as airway management, regional anaesthesia and ultrasound use. He was the go-to person for difficult cases, and made tangible contributions instructing in and co-ordinating training workshops run by the South African Society of Anaesthesiologists. He was also committed to research as a regular reviewer for the South African Journal of Anaesthesia and Analgesia.

He was a councillor in the South African Society of Anaesthesiologists between 2016 and 2020, serving in various capacities, including the private sector business unit that oversees private sector Anaesthetics services. He was a great advocate of diversity and transformation in the Anaesthesiology speciality.

He was socially responsible, mentoring and supporting other colleagues. We will miss his outgoing nature, sense of humour, positive energy and open communication style. His death comes at a time when the health system is buckling under the pressure of COVID-19. His calm, methodical demeanour and approach to

problemsolving will be sorely missed in the fight against Covid-19. As the President of the College of Anaesthetists of South Africa, I have lost a personal friend and, on behalf of CASA, wish to extend our heartfelt condolences to Dr Mononyane's family and the families of the colleagues who perished in the helicopter crash.



### PROFESSOR JACOB JOHANNES (JOHAN) DEMPERS

### PROFESSOR ANDREW WALUBO

## CMSA Membership Privileges

## Criteria for CMSA Endorsement of CPD Activities

1. The CPD activity and its content will have to meet the approval of the relevant College council and considered to be of a standard that will enhance the image of that College.
2. The organizer of the CPD activity should ideally be a member of the CMSA in good standing.
3. The constituent College must take full responsibility for the completion of the CPD accreditation application. Any CMSA membership discount to be noted under "Registration Fee involved for participants" on the CPD 2A Form.
4. The CPD activities should primarily be run under the banner of the constituent College of the CMSA. Due restraint should be exercised by the respective college ensuring that engagement in partnerships with organizations and entities in CPD activities remain appropriate and in keeping with the standing of the CMSA.
5. The constituent Colleges of the CMSA should not associate themselves with CPD activities of commercial entities related to product launches or product specific CPD activities.
6. Sponsorships of these CPD activities are permissible provided that the principles as set out below are closely adhered to:
  - a. The names of the sponsors should not be included in the title of the CPD activity.
  - b. The sponsor may be acknowledged as a sponsor on the advert/ notification and on the programme for the CPD activity but no advertising of the commercial entities products should appear on either of these documents.
  - c. The mailing of adverts/notifications of the CPD activities may however be accompanied by product literature separated from and not incorporated in the notification/advert of the CPD activity.
  - d. No product promotion is allowed within the CPD meeting room but company-branded items and promotional material may be displayed in a separate area that should not be accessible to the general public if the products are not allowed to be advertised to the public.
  - e. In addition to the above, the sponsored activities should strictly adhere to the code pertaining to marketing and promotions to healthcare professionals as set out by the Marketing Code Authority.
7. The determination of the Risk and Profit split remains within the discretion of each individual college in consultation with the organisers of the activity. The overall principle that Risk Share follows Profit Share must apply.
8. However, the main thrust of running CPD activities under the auspices of the CMSA and its constituent Colleges remains most importantly the provision of benefits for ongoing membership of the CMSA, the enhancement of the overall image of constituent College and the CMSA and not the generation of additional income.
 

A benefit in the form of a meaningful discount for the CPD activity registration fee for CMSA members in good standing should take preference over profit sharing and remain the chief consideration.

This was a very important motivation for extending free CPD accreditation originally.
9. On completion of the activity the organisers of the CPD activity must provide the College with a final assessment by the participants with the minimum of the following points to be covered:
  - a. Content
  - b. Presentation
  - c. Organisation / Administration
  - d. Venue
  - e. Overall value
